NARROW GAUGE, THE WIDER STORY

Often overlooked, but no less important, narrow gauge railways have played an important role in the railway story.

Since those early days of railways in the North East of England, railways have spread across the world, transporting people and goods, working in quarries, construction, defence, agriculture and industry.

Narrow gauge railways offered a less expensive alternative to standard gauge and enabled large networks to be built, often in difficult terrain where standard gauge would be expensive or just impossible.

The locomotives in operation at our gala cover a selection of types which worked in many industries around the world. Together, their operational lives reflect how narrow gauge railways grew internationally.

In 1863, the Ffestiniog Railway proved it was practical to operate steam engines on narrow gauge track. The world looked on and began to copy.

In the late 1800s, Paul Decauville in France, developed an innovative, portable railway system with sectional track, rolling stock and locomotives. This formed the basis of the trench railways of the First World War which moved supplies and munitions to the front. After hostilities ended, surplus equipment enabled many budding railway concerns to build narrow gauge lines at knockdown prices.


From the Victorian period until the rise of the modern dumper truck, most large construction sites laid narrow-gauge lines with small steam locomotives moving materials and increasing efficiency.

Successes with internal combustion engine locomotives during WW1 sowed the seed for manufacturers to start the move away from steam traction. Narrow gauge railways were early adopters of these new locomotives, where their low operating cost and ability to be instantly stopped and started made them useful for lines where work was unpredictable or infrequent.

As steam finally gave way to diesel, manufacturers started to supply engines to the various industries here and abroad to replace their ageing steam locomotives.

With commendable foresight, enthusiasts found narrow-gauge steam right around the world, repatriating them in various states of condition, paving the way for the narrow-gauge heritage movement.

At our gala 'narrow gauge, the wider story' we celebrate those locomotives, their heritage and international operations - recognising the special place they have held across the 200 years of the railways.





The Stockton and Darlington Railway opened on the 27th September 1825. It's considered the first modern railway, operating passenger and freight trains, and open to the public. Previous lines had been freight only, sometimes carrying employees or passengers in an ad-hoc way, the Stockton and Darlington paved the way for railways everywhere.

This year we join in with the country-wide celebrations of **Railway 200** by highlighting the impact that narrow gauge railways have had around the world.

We welcome you to Woody Bay, whether returning or new to this special place. We hope you enjoy the weekend and thank you for your continued support.

The guest engines

Chaloner was built in North Wales in 1877, by the De Winton and Co. for the Pen-Y-Bryn slate quarry, later moving to the larger Pen-yr-Orsedd quarry where it worked out its days. Its vertical-boilered construction was used extensively in the **Welsh** quarrying industry. The locomotive was cheap to build, perfect for the slate quarries.

Peter Pan, built in 1922, is a member of the Kerr Stuart 'Wren' class. The small size and simplicity meant Wrens were well suited to moving between work sites. Peter Pan worked in **Essex** until 1929 then moved to Wilminstone Quarry in Tavistock. It came to Beacon Down Quarry near Killington Lane at a later date, and has not visited Woody Bay since 2005.

Boothby is a 'Planet Y Type'. Planet locomotives were exported around the globe but Boothby when built in 1933 went to work at Stanstead Nurseries **Essex**. They had a number of glasshouses and a narrow gauge locomotive was in use to supply the site. In 1957 Boothby moved to the Boothby Peat Company in Cumbria before finally entering preservation in 1968.

Faith, North **Dorset** Locomotive Works 0-4-2T was expertly built from scratch by our Chief Engineer, John Uphill and represents narrow gauge railways recreated for pleasure and heritage. The diminutive Faith is coming back to Woody Bay metals after a period of several years away.









Our home engines

Lyn is a replica Baldwin locomotive built for the L&B in 1898 representing the heyday of American narrow gauge. Built in the USA Lyn is typical of North American engines of the time with a wooden cab, sand domes, bar frames and cowcatchers. Lyn was designed for passenger work, with large wheels, enabling higher speeds. When built, there were over 11,000 miles of narrow gauge in the US.



Sir George Newnes was ordered in 1944 by the Tongaat Sugar Company in **South Africa**. Wartime shortages meant it was finally dispatched in March 1946. Originally, the engine was named Charles Whytock after a Scottish emigrant who became a senator in South Africa and a senior director at the Tongaat Sugar Company. The history of this engine is linked to the British Empire.



Baguley-Drewery 2393 "Pilton" is a diesel mechanical locomotive built for the Victoria Mill in Queensland Australia in 1952, recieving the name Leichhardt in 1974. Now fitted with a 180HP Gardener 6LXB engine and with the cab cut down to fit the L&BR loading gauge, Pilton is a powerful and very useful member of our fleet, used for our track maintenance trains.



Hunslets Heddon Hall & D6552 were built in 1965 for the MOD, and spent their working lives hidden away on one of the plethora of MOD railways. They both worked at Dean Hill Munitions storage facility in Wiltshire from new until 2003, when the railway system was disbanded and road transport took over.



Axe, Kerr, Stuart & Co Ltd No. 2451 was built at Stoke-on-Trent in 1915. A side and well tank locomotive, it was one of seventy 60cm gauge "Joffre" Class (named after the French First World War Commander) ordered by the French government for service on the Western Front during World War I. Axe is currently awaiting overhaul and out of service.



All the engines (apart from Axe) will be on passenger or goods trains over the gala weekend (subject to availability). Why not tick them off as you see them? All engines, including Axe, feature in Sunday's International Parade.



If you have not seen the award-winning restoration of the **delightful Chelfham station**, a visit is a must over the gala weekend and there's always something new to explore.

Recent changes include an improved viewing area over the impressive viaduct, newly recreated signals and further enhancements to the original station building.

Our enthusiastic volunteers, who have worked tirelessly on the restoration, will be on hand to show off their progress.

Open 10.00 until 17.00 both days of the gala, the station's postcode is EX31 4RP, the entrance to the station is ///patio.roosts.custodian (what3words). Parking is signed.

Woody Bay cafe (past the station building)

Carriage Shelter

By the car park you can see the progress with our new carriage shelter, essential for keeping our rolling stock protected from the worst of North Devon's weather.

Barnstaple Signal Box

Our volunteers are hard at work restoring the Barnstaple Town signal box. They are repairing the original structure and making new windows where originals were lost.

Van 23

Over the summer progress on the underframe of Van 23 has slowed, but work will ramp-up to complete the rolling chassis which will be painted before going to our specialist carriage team in Essex for bodywork completion.

Extension plans

Members recently overwhelming voted to make an application for an extension to Parracombe village. Development work on the application has now commenced in parallel with continuing activities on Blackmoor to Whistlandpound, the second members' choice.

Governance

Recently Trustees and Directors agreed that the present model (i.e. a charitable Trust and separate operating company, the CIC) has served the railway well over recent years but now may not be the most efficient or effective solution needed for the future. Therefore potential new models of governance are being investigated that will more effectively serve the needs and expectations of our members, staff, volunteers, funders and other stakeholders.


